Alumni Scholarship Program News: Six Awards Made to Junior and Senior Brothers

Once again, in the last 12 months, Delta Chapter alumni made generous gifts to this valuable scholarship program that was set up in 1996 to help our brothers and their families cope with the ever-increasing cost of an RPI education. As of November 30, 2017, fund donations since inception total over \$610,000, an increase of \$60,000 since last year at this time. And similar to last year, a big reason for this increase is the continued extreme generosity of Nick Donofrio '67.

In 2016 Nick broke through the \$50,000 lifetime giving level, which was almost double the highest individual level achieved over the Scholarship Fund's first 20 years; and then in 2017 he actually doubled down again, bringing his total giving to \$100,000 a level we never even thought about in 1996 (and probably one that will not be reached again for quite a few years)! The impact of these big increases in the Scholarship Fund brought last year's award pool up to \$22,000, and this year to \$30,000. It is possible that for the 2017-2018 school year the available award pool could approach \$40,000.

But enough about the numbers. Now we present a short biography of each of the six awardees, in alphabetical order.

Scott Black '19 is a junior mechanical engineering major from Stillwater, New Jersey, who plays right tackle for the RPI football team. Scott is currently the house manager and would like to serve on the executive board prior to graduation. This past summer, Scott completed an internship with Oldcastle Precast, which was attained through an alumni connection. After graduation Scott plans on working in the manufacturing engineering field and studying to get a master's degree. "The relationships and connections I have made through the fraternity have already made an impact on my life, and I know that these bonds will last forever. Living in the house was the best decision I have made since coming to RPI, and it has definitely made me grow as an individual. Going to school at RPI is a financial burden for my family, but the fact that my brothers are there to support me and offer a helping hand with this scholarship is extremely reassuring. I cannot thank the alumni enough for alleviating some of that financial burden. I look forward to being

Remembering Jeff Calero '96



On October 14 a group of nearly 40 Theta Chi brothers, family, and friends gathered at the ECAV stadium for a ceremony to unveil a memorial paver in honor of Brother Jeff Calero '96 (major, U.S. Army), who was killed in action 10 years ago during his second deployment to Afghanistan as part of Operation Enduring Freedom.

Jeff was born in Puerto Rico and grew up in Queens, New York City. While at RPI, Jeff majored in mechanical engineering, played football, participated in the Army ROTC program, and was an active member of Theta Chi. During his time in the service, Jeff earned numerous awards and decorations, including three Army Commendation Medals and the coveted Green Beret in 2001.
